Neurodivergent is a term discussing a set of **Processing Characteristics**.

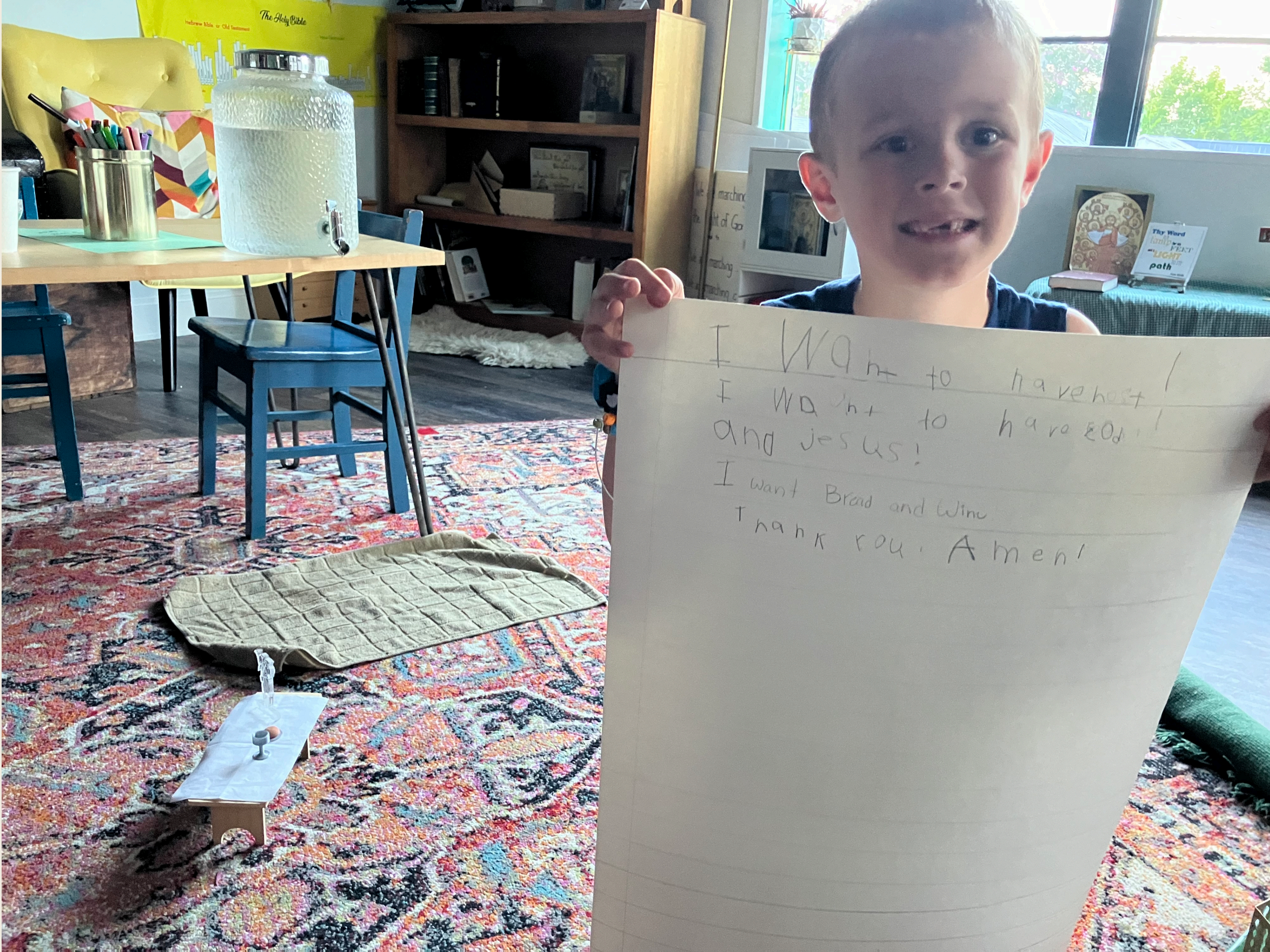
Which determines how a person **functions in a particular context**

Which impacts **their learning capabilities**.

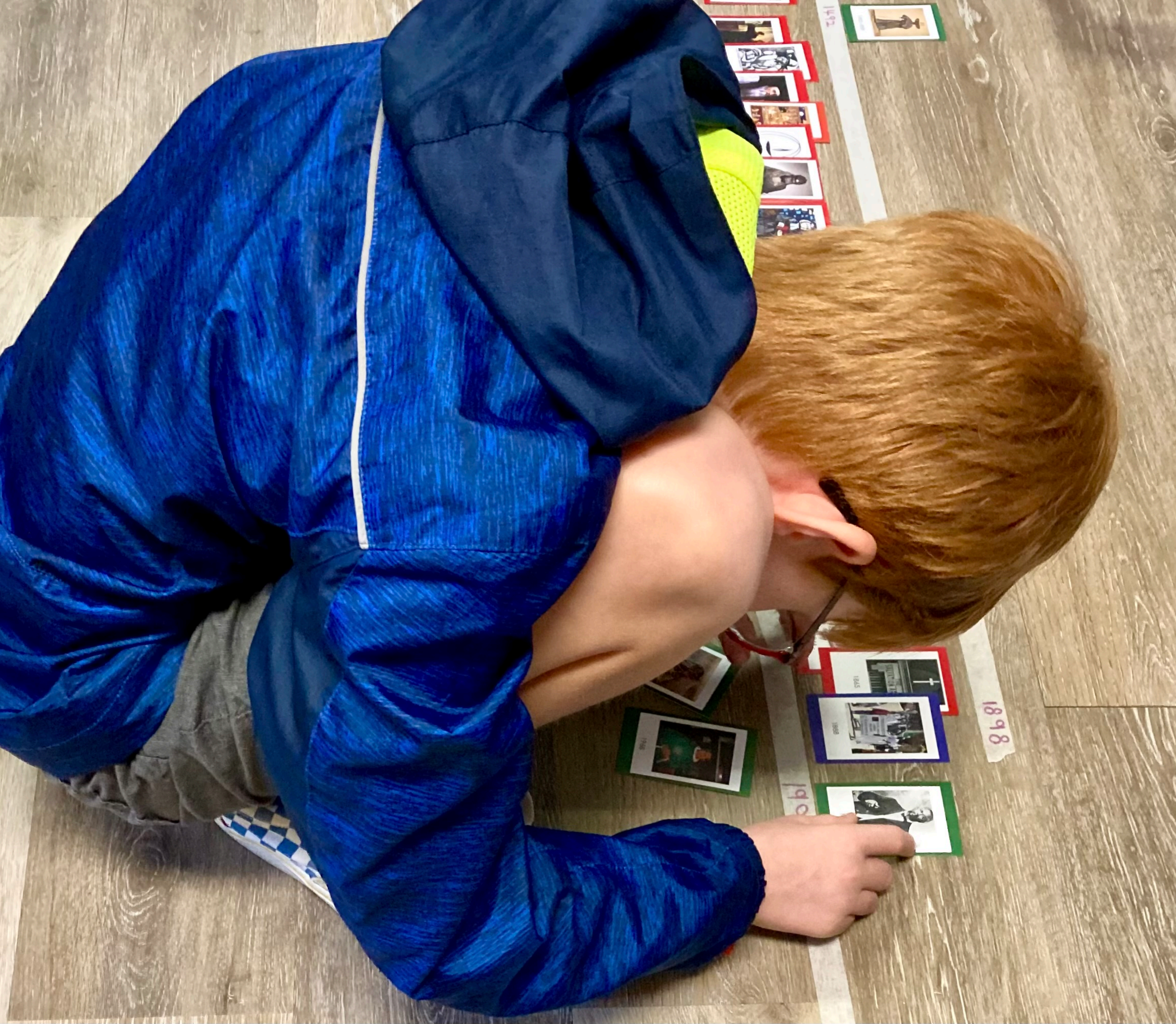
Image Description: Two Black children's hands placing puzzle map pieces onto a control map of the Holy Land.
